## 2021 PROJECT PARTNERS

Our non-government organization (NGO) partners in Africa continued to request support for their education, training and health needs, especially urgent requests for medical supplies in the midst of the pandemic.

Harambee USA was there to help when needed most. In 2021, we funded initiatives in Ivory Coast, Nigeria, DR Congo and Kenya, Nigeria and Kenya.

### **Wale Health Center / Niger Hospital Foundation**

- In Ivory Coast, Wale has urgent needs to treat COVID-19 patients, including cleaning supplies, personal protective equipment (PPE) for nurses, oxygen tanks, remote training materials and ventilators.
- Niger Hospital Foundation in Nigeria, requested to fund at least one purchase of a much-needed ventilator in their critical unit.

Harambee USA granted \$5,000 to Wale, (population 335,000) and \$9,800 to Niger hospital (population 800,000) for this urgent need.



### **Yangala, DR Congo**

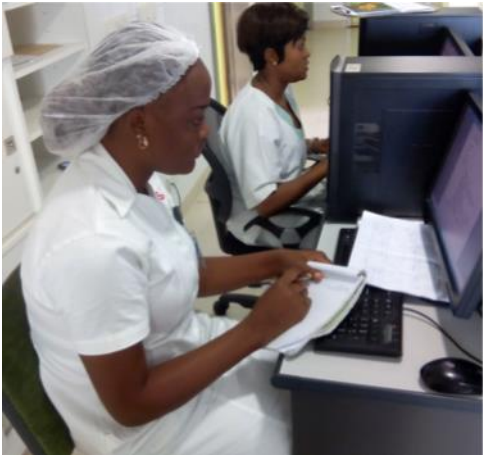
Kuiza Kuajima elementary school is located in Yangala, DR Congo. Most of the 300 school children aged 3 to 12 are orphans, poor and unschooled and are the result of the Kamuena Nsapu war that took place from December 2016 to June 2017 during which more than 430 people died, leaving widows and children behind. During that conflict, the militias looted the parishes, destroyed and burned the school and its meager furnishings and equipment. The children had to attend classes outdoors. Harambee's €5,000 grant helped rebuild the school

### **Fr. Gibillini Nursery School, Kenya**

Started by the Ivrea Sister in 2014, this school in the Diocese of Homabay works with neglected children, particularly those who are HIV-positive. The school supports the children's emotional, mental and social well-being by providing education, skills training and health programs. It seeks to build and operate a chicken farm to help meet strong local demand for poultry products while generating income and creating jobs for some recent graduates. Harambee granted €20,000 for this two-year project that helped the school's 300 children.







## Democratic Republic of Congo

### Tuition Assistance Program

Monkole Hospital in Kinshasa is home to the Institut Supérieur en Science Infirmières (ISSI), the top-ranked nursing school in DR Congo. Now that Harambee USA has raised its \$56,000 targeted funding for the Nursing Scholarship Program which ends in 2022, Harambee USA has established a Tuition Assistance Program to subsidize the schooling of incoming nursing students.

Harambee's scholarship assisted 10 nursing students. The TAP program helped 15 nursing students.
